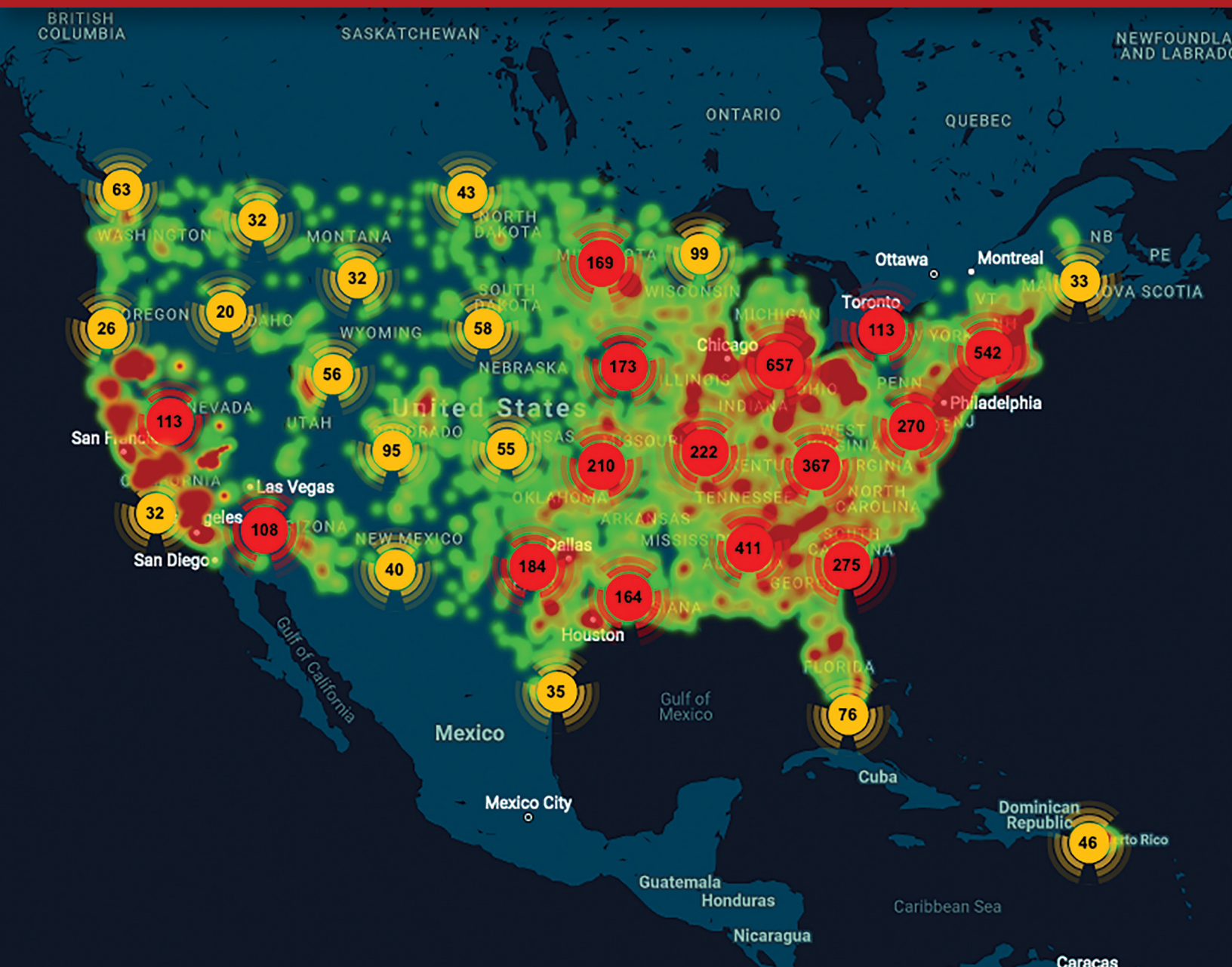

# PROLOGUE

**Civil unrest** in urban areas during the summer of 2020 has sparked renewed interest in the Pentagon's transfer of surplus military equipment to local law enforcement agencies.

Liberals tend to raise civil liberties concerns while conservatives question why the federal government is involving itself in area of responsibility traditionally reserved for states and local communities.

In the database provided by the U.S. government, 581,000 items of military gear worth \$1.8 billion were distributed to domestic law enforcement since 1993. All items were in current inventory at local law enforcement agencies as of March 2020.

We found that military equipment flowed into 8,200 communities across America. Quite likely, your own hometown police received some gear.

Even small town police departments now possess mine resistant vehicles, armored trucks, helicopters, M16's and M14's, infrared goggles, and grenade launchers.

Critics and advocates of the program must grapple with the key question: **“What legitimate law enforcement purpose is served by the procurement of military hardware, and, therefore, the militarization of our domestic police departments?”**

## SCOPE & METHODOLOGY

Our *OpenTheBooks Oversight Report: Program 1033 – \$1.8 Billion In Military Gear Transferred To Local Police Agencies* is a survey of current inventories. Our auditors reviewed the data across all 50 states including deeper dives into the ten most populous and the three least populous states.

We obtained the data for our report from the Pentagon through open records requests and the “Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006.” This report quantified all disclosed transfer of equipment, gear, and weaponry since 1993 that is in the current inventory of domestic law enforcement as of March 31, 2020.

## BACKGROUND

“In the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for fiscal years 1990 and 1991, Congress authorized the transfer of excess Department of Defense (DoD) property to federal, state and local law enforcement agencies. Congress later passed the NDAA for fiscal year 1997, which allows law enforcement agencies to acquire property for bona fide law enforcement purposes – particularly those associated with counter-drug and counter-terrorism activities.”

Approximately 8,200 federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies from forty-nine states and four U.S. territories participated in the program.

The DoD transfers two kinds of property: controlled and non-controlled.

Controlled property includes small arms/personal weapons, demilitarized vehicles, aircraft, etc. These items are loaned to law enforcement while the DoD retains the title.

Non-controlled property consists of common items such as office equipment, computers, first aid kits/supplies, hand tools, sleeping bags, clothing, etc. The ownership of non-controlled property transfers after one year.

# TOP 10 TAKEAWAYS

**1 THE PENTAGON** transferred 581,034 items of **surplus military gear** worth **\$1.8 billion** since 1993 – an amount that only includes the items still held today by law enforcement agencies.

## **2 HEAVY EQUIPMENT**

Transfers included **mine resistant vehicles** (1,099 items, **\$743.8 million** value); **trucks** (cargo, panel, van, dump, utility, lift, and military) (3,465 items, **\$251 million** value); **helicopters** (344 items, **\$83.6 million** value); **airplanes** (24 items, **\$104.8 million** value); and **armored trucks and cars** (284 items, **\$24.4 million** value).

## **3 WEAPONRY**

Transfers included **rifles, 5.56mm and 7.62mm** (66,375 items, **\$26.2 million** value); **pistols, .38, .40, .45 caliber** (7,339 items, **\$689,553** value); **riot 12-gauge shotguns** (1,218 items, **\$121,611** value); **bayonets** (167 items, **\$11,690** value), and **grenade launchers** (7 items, **\$27,814** value).

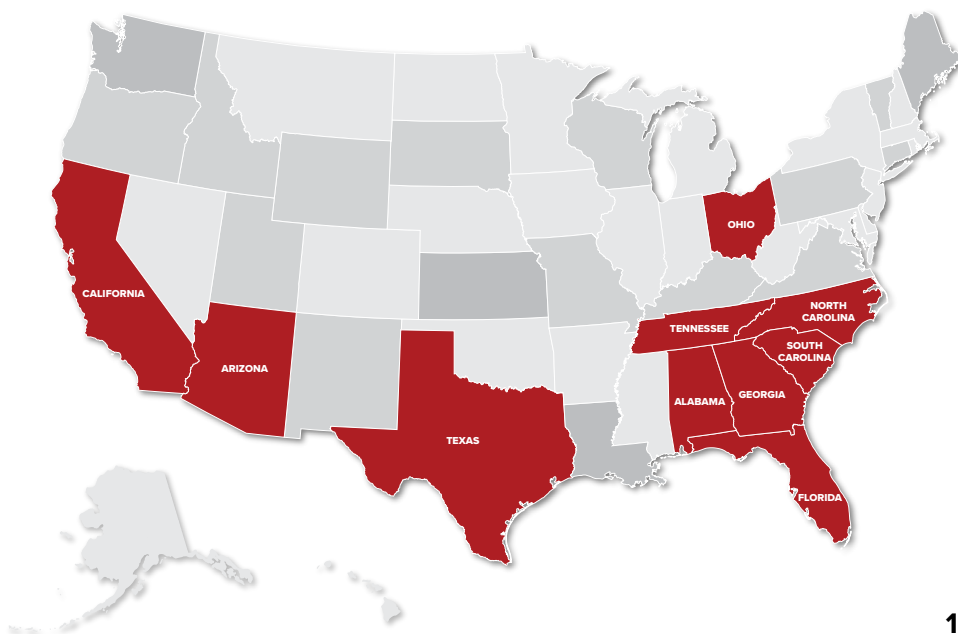
## **4 OTHER GEAR**

Transfers included **night-vision sights, sniper scopes, binoculars, telescopes, and goggles** (131,358 items, **\$42 million** value); **mine detecting sets, marking kits, and probes** (230 items, **\$599,341 million** value).

## **5 MILITARY ROBOTS**

Transfers included **remote controlled vehicles, underwater vehicles, explosive ordnance disposal, and stun devices** (451 items, **\$20.4 million** value).

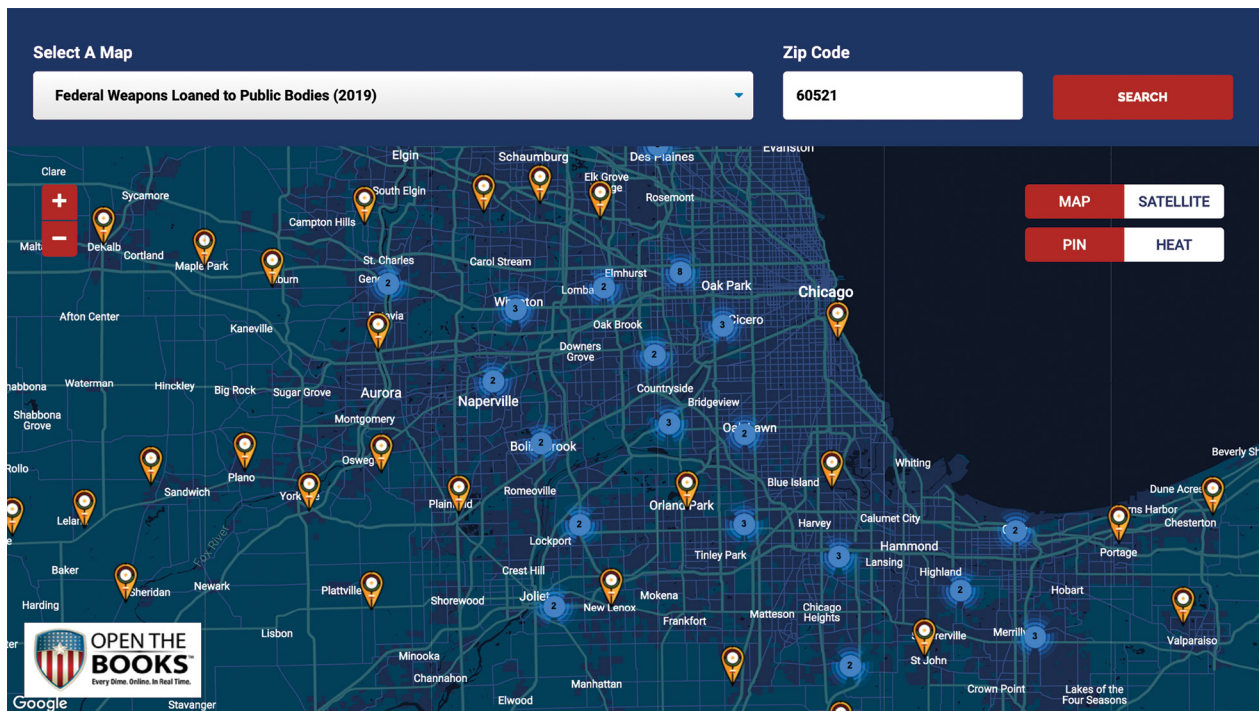

## 7 TOP LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY

The Department of Law Enforcement of Tallahassee, Florida (**\$20.6 million**) received an amount that exceeded the sum total of the bottom seven states. Items included **fixed wing aircrafts (\$17 million)**, **multi-mode imaging system (\$2.5 million)**, and a **utility system modular tent (\$229,062)**.

## 9 MOST EXPENSIVE AND LEAST EXPENSIVE ITEMS

The California Highway Patrol received a **\$22 million fixed wing aircraft** in 2016. The Arizona Department of Public Safety received **\$51 million in fixed wing aircraft (3)** delivered on December 3, 2015 with each plane valued at **\$17 million**.

**Least Expensive Item** – two wood screws (**23 cents**) transferred to the Weatherly Police Department in Pennsylvania on June 5, 2019.

**10** The only state not in the federal data receiving Program 1033 surplus military equipment is Hawaii.

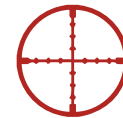

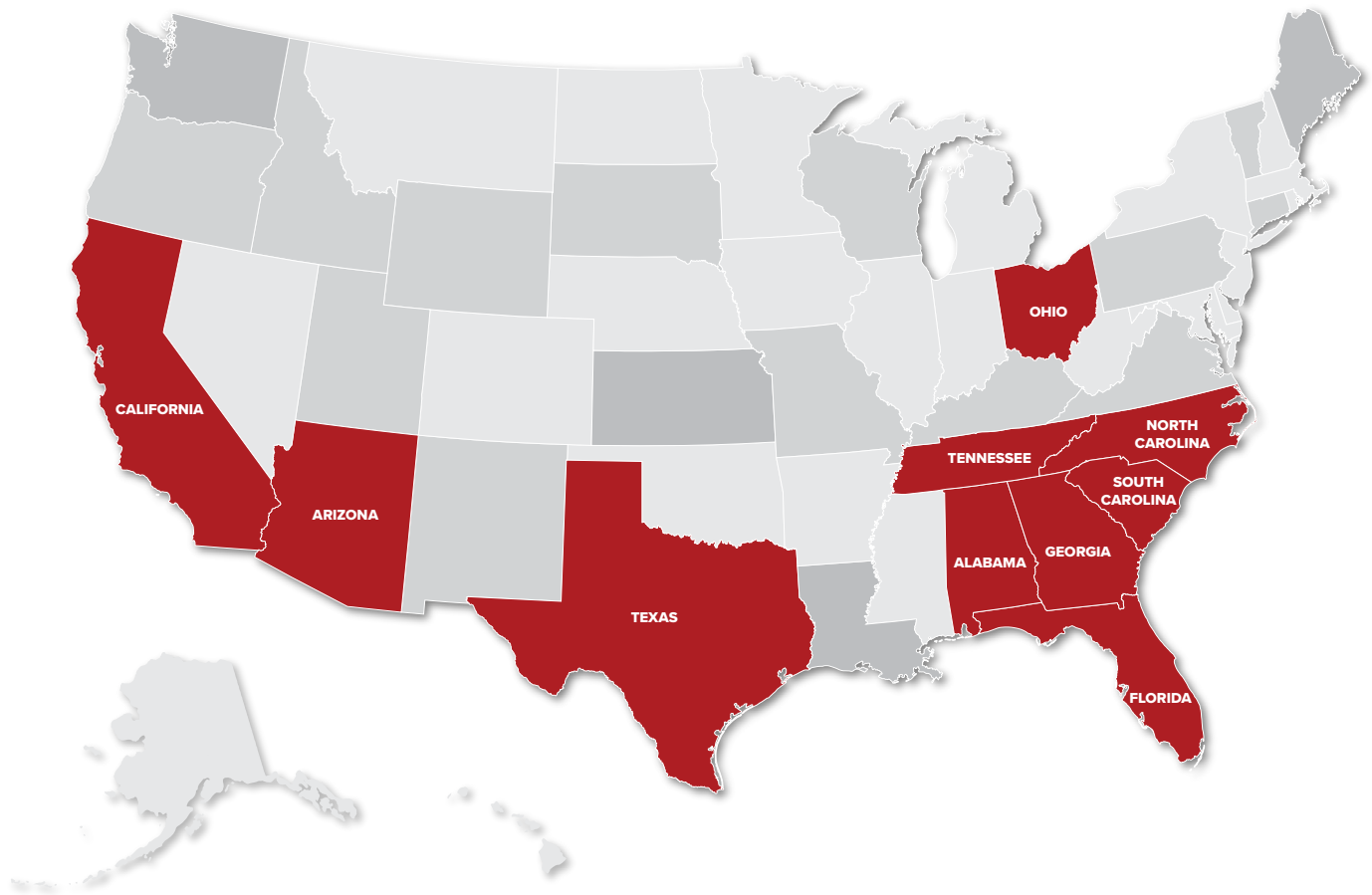

In California, the top 6 items transferred to local police were **54 mine resistant vehicles (\$36.5 million)**, **2 fixed wing aircraft (\$22.1 million)**, **17 helicopters (\$15.7 million)**, **97 Packbot remote controlled iRobots (\$7.5 million)**, **76 unmanned ground vehicles (\$5.1 million)**, and **6 small craft boats (\$4.4 million)**. Some miscellaneous items included **1,598 national flags**, **981 pairs of men's underwear**, and **1,307 ball-point pens**.

There were **4,606 5.56mm rifles (\$2.1 million)**, **359 7.62mm rifles (\$49,542)**, **751 image illuminator night vision**, **718 infrared illuminators (\$392,384)**, **2 platform optic sniper rifles (\$374)**, and **68 night vision sniper scopes (\$838,500)**.



The Santa Barbara Sheriff Department (\$8 million) received the most gear. Top items included:

Amador County (population: 38,000) in the Sierra Nevada mountains procured **2 mine-resistant vehicles** (**\$1.3 million**) – as did Los Angeles County (population: 10 million).

San Francisco received nearly **\$1 million** of surplus military equipment including 320 items: **136 infrared illuminators**, **100 night vision scopes**, **49 reflex and thermal sights**, **2 night-vision sniper scopes**, and a **remote ordinance neutralization robot** (**\$185,493**).

Also, the budget cited our report on the National Endowment of the Arts as the principle reason to eliminate the agency.

### In 2019...

Our *Top 82 U.S. Non-Profit Hospitals: Quantifying Government Payments & Financial Assets* report launched on *FOX News' Tucker Carlson Tonight* and *USA TODAY*. This report backstopped President Trump's two executive orders on healthcare price transparency by showing that wealthy charitable non-profit healthcare providers and their CEO's were making big profits. Colorado Governor Jared Polis (D) also cited this data in his state of the state address while arguing for price reforms.

### In 2018...

Open The Books' *Mapping The Swamp, A Study Of The Administrative State* Media report launched on *FOX News' Laura Ingraham Show* and directly led to Representative Judy Hice's (R-GA) legislation on pension and bonus transparency (H.R. 2612). Furthermore, we briefed the Executive Office of the President, Office of Management & Budget regarding our policy ideas to drain the swamp.

### In 2017...

The Tax Cuts And Jobs Act 2017, passed into law and included a claw-back tax on Ivy League-style, excessive university endowments. The *Boston Globe* cited our *Ivy League, Inc.* oversight report as a catalyst for the legislative provision.

### In 2016...

We exposed the \$20 million luxury-art procurement program at the Department of Veterans Affairs, which forced a public apology from the V.A. Secretary and the adoption of new rules to stop the abuse.
