## OpenTheBooks Oversight Report - Where's The Pork?

Report maps \$583 billion in fiscal year 2016 federal grants, identifies 50 examples of wasteful projects

OpenTheBooks.com – a national transparency organization – today released its Where's the Pork oversight report, including 50 examples of wasteful federal grants, costing taxpayers tens of millions of dollars. Research shows porkbarrel spending is bipartisan, as the top 50 grant-receiving districts are represented by 27 democrats and 23 republicans. The top 10 congressional districts are evenly split: 5 democrats and 5 republicans. Consider just a few examples:

- Virtual Reality Platform to Teach Children in China How to Cross the Street \$183,750 from the Department of Health and Human Services funded a virtual reality platform in China to teach safe pedestrian techniques.
- New Condom Design with More Lubrication \$200,601 in taxpayer money funded a new condom design that lowers the chance of breakage and increases "satisfaction between partners."
- Cigar Taste Test \$114,375 funded a study to determine whether cigar flavor affected its addictiveness.
- **Sex Ed for Prostitutes in California** \$1.5 million funded "safer sex and needle" education for prostitutes in California even though prostitution is illegal in the state.
- Space Racers: An Animated Children's Cartoon \$2.5 million in NASA funding supported the production of two seasons of a children's cartoon series about galactic adventures.

"Politicians from both parties argue that there's nowhere to cut – but our oversight report proves congressional leadership wrong," OpenTheBooks CEO and Founder Adam Andrzejewski said. "As the federal debt surpassed \$21 trillion, our waste book details 50 case studies of taxpayer abuse."

The federal government doled out 560,771 grants in fiscal year 2016, totaling \$583 billion. On average, each federal grant amounted to more than \$1 million. These grants flowed to all sorts of entities including state governments, higher education institutions, nonprofit organizations, for-profit organizations, individuals, and more.

Fortune 100 companies received nearly \$3.2 billion in grants despite reporting hundreds of billions in revenues (FY2014-206). Boeing can't argue it needed \$774 million in federal grants while banking more than \$95 billion in 2016 annual revenue. Meanwhile, some nonprofit organizations depend almost entirely on government money to stay afloat. In their most recent tax documents, Battelle Memorial Institute reported \$4.8 billion in total revenue – and \$4.5 billion of it came from government contracts and grants. Battelle's CEO pulled down \$2.7 million in compensation and six other employees made more than \$1 million each.
