#### Good Evening,

I am writing to file a written complaint and seek clarity on why Proviso Leyden Council for Community Action, Inc. (PLCCA) was not recommended as a "Coordinating or Providing Partner" to implement the components of the Village of Maywood Neighborhood Recovery Initiative (NRI).

Proviso-Leyden Council for Community Action, Inc. (PLCCA) was established in 1968 by Bishop Dr. Claude Porter as a private, non-for-profit corporation, to serve low-income residents in Cook County's Proviso and Leyden Townships, the municipality of Norridge and the Chicago metropolitan area. PLCCA currently operates its 30+ assistance programs with an operating budget of approximately \$6 million and maintains a total property value of approximately \$9 million. Services provided are based on a commitment to two simple processes, helping people help themselves and community participation in PLCCA programs through volunteering.

On December 1, 2010, PLCCA submitted an application (application attached) to the Village of Maywood to become a partner in the Neighborhood Recovery Initiative. PLCCA applied to partner in the following service areas: Mentoring Plus Jobs, Parent Leadership, School-Based Counseling, and the Reentry Program.

PLCCA has been in the community for over forty years and understands that meeting the needs of the community cannot be accomplished by a single entity. So over the years, PLCCA has partnered with the private companies, public agencies, non-profit and faith-based organizations to increase the capacity to meet the needs of individuals and families in the community.

Your closing fiscal report for activities and budgets covered by the Englewood Neighborhood Recovery Initiative (ENRI) indicated Christ Center of Truth (CCT) had \$8,877.03 in unexpended grant funds as of September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2011. In accordance with the terms of your grant agreement in Section IV part B: "All funds not expended by the end of the grant period are to be returned to the Lead Agency within 30 days of the end of the grant period, unless the parties have agreed in writing to do otherwise."

Since October 1, 2011 there have been several attempts made to resolve this issue, the last being a meeting on January 30, 2012 between you, PLAN Coordinator, Children's Home + Aid Regional Accountant and ENRI Project Director to discuss your request to decrease amount owed. It was at this meeting the decision stood and all funds would be owed. A payment plan was then requested by you, which Children's Home + Aid agreed to on the terms that a good faith payment be made in the amount of \$1,000.

On February 8, 2012 we received a payment in the amount of \$150 along with a letter stating the uncertainty of the next payment and the amount. While we appreciate the efforts of CCT, this is not the agreement made between Children's Home + Aid and CCT. We are requesting the full remaining balance of \$8727.03 be made by March 9, 2012. This matter has also been referred to our current NRI funder, the Illinois Violence Prevention Authority. Failure to pay the remaining balance could result in further action.

We look forward to your immediate attention to this matter.

Moving forward, I will be putting in place a monthly review of these data files and regular follow ups with the staff responsible for correcting the data to eliminate the need to do post-clean up like this.

Per your request, I have audited the supporting documentation provided for the Quarterly Report for Project Hope. It should be noted that Project Hope, in addition to the Re-Entry Program, also runs a Day Care out of their facility. The issues regarding this will probably be noted in Jaclin's report, my report only covers the financial assessment of the 1" Quarter Report submitted by the organization. I feel the need to communicate this however, because it does impact the results of my review.

In summary, the results of my review indicate that Project Hope has a cash flow issue, and as it is for most small organizations, when funds are received, they are expended on the most pressing outstanding bills at the time. I noted that while IVPA funds may have been used for overhead and other program activities; funds received from another funding source, for the Day Care program, were used to cover some of the IVPA expenses. Under the categories reported to IVPA on the 1" Quarterly Report, I identified the following issues:

- O Project Hope had a negative balance of \$754.39 in their General Fund when the IVPA check was deposited. When the IVPA funds it, it absorbed that negative balance.
- O IVPA funds hit in April early in the month and were used to cover several outstanding expenses for the organization overall at the time to keep the doors open including overhead and those of the Day Care Program ran by the organization.
- O When funds hit later in the month of April, Project hope did not pay off the outstanding balance of the expenses occurred to date for IVPA Re-Entry. In particular, the outstanding balance to A. Mathews of \$4,447.25 has not been paid.

Project hope does have a formal Check Request Form and Authorization Process to track IVPA expenses separately from other program expenses, and the expenses reported appear to be valid. In my opinion, I don't believe Project Hope was fraudulent in the expenses reported to IVPA, it is more a matter of timing of cash flows, lack of planning and communication, and bad decision making.

Please seed the attached Audit Summary showing the amount reported and my comments for each category.

Based on my analysis of Project Hope as an HCI/ IVPA/NRI subcontractor I came up with the following results:

- 1) Project Hope did not provide sufficient documentation that gives indication that the payment made in the first quarter was utilized properly. They include the following:
  - a) Asonti Matthews's salary was to be paid with the first payment to Project Hope. Checks were produced for payment (Check # 2143, 4/29/11 for \$1,799.00 and check # 2145, 6/3/11 for \$1,978.90) but were never given to her. According to our conservation with Dr. Allen & Mr. Gumm on 1.25.12 they were having difficulty locating Ms. Matthews to pay her. To date HCI has no proof that Ms. Matthews was finally paid by Project Hope Early Learning Center due to Jaclin Davis being instructed by Addie Allen, CAO of HCI not to contact Ms. Matthews for verification for legal reasons. Also, please note that neither Dr. Allen nor Ms. Matthews, the case manager assigned, could not produce the deliverables that warranted any work was performed per the contractual terms. This agency did not have a functioning Re Entry program to begin with, as the facility and space Dr. Allen appointed for Project Hope is within a day care center
  - b) Checks made payable to Dr. Marlene Allen and James Harrison for payroll were processed but were never cashed. Instead, the checks were donated to Project Hope for "Operational Purposes". Never got a response from Dr. Allen pertaining to the reason why payroll checks are being voided and donated to Project Hope for "Operational Expenses". Also, it was asked as to which "Operational Expenses" were paid and for what operation (Day Care vs. Project Hope), as well as requesting documentation for those "Operational Expenses" Per our conversation with Dr. Allen and her finance person Darryl Gumm, neither could explain what the "Operational Expenses" donation covered. No receipts, invoices or other documentation was presented when questioned where the monies went.
  - c) Questionable expenses regarding equipment costs and other line items, as there is not sufficient documentation to indicate full payment to vendors (bank statements to verify check disbursements and cashed checks). Equipment was not available to view at location per requirements of State of Illinois regarding equipment purchases. Per state requirements, each item of furniture/equipment should be available and tagged for inspection upon request. No item per alleged purchases was present per Dr. Allen.
  - d) An additional payment was made to Project Hope (\$5,003.82) based on a legal dispute regarding payment to Asonti Matthews 1<sup>st</sup> quarter debt. Again a payment made on behalf of Dr. Allen was donated for "Operational Expenses" for the second quarter.

- 10. August 12, 2011 per instruction of IVPA, I e mailed a 2nd Close Our Request from Project Hope Early Learning Center along with a phone call that resulted in another voice mail.
- 11. August 13, 2011 per instruction of CEO of HCI I mailed Project Hope Early Learning Center a Termination Letter which was received on August 15, 2011. I e mailed the letter to IVPA also.
- 12. September 1, 2011 per IVPA I e mailed a 3<sup>rd</sup> Close Out Request to Project Hope Early Learning Center to Dr. Marlene Allen with a phone call that resulted in a voicemail.
- 13. September 12, 2011 I received a Close Out Report from Project Hope Early Learning Center, I emailed the report to Lorri Jenkins & Tara Cameron; which is not to the satisfaction of IVPA per phone call with Lorri Jenkins.









# Funding

Revenue for IVPA grantmaking and operations comes from two sources: 1) proceeds from the sale and renewal of special Prevent

Violence (PV) license plates that are deposited in the Violence Prevention Fund in the state treasury; and 2) state General Revenue Funds (GRF). Each year, IVPA receives an appropriation from each of these sources through the state executive and legislative budget process.

A large majority of the annual IVPA appropriation is then granted to local and statewide organizations to conduct violence prevention efforts consistent with the purpose of specific IVPA grant programs developed by the IVPA board to further the agency's mission and strategic goals.

Over the past ten years, IVPA has awarded nearly \$64.4 million to over 1,500 grantees throughout Illinois. As the map on this page demonstrates, IVPA has ensured that violence prevention resources reach every region of the state. The annual IVPA grants budget has grown from \$400,000 in year one to over \$3.4 million in FY 07 with peak amounts of over \$16.6 per year during the three year period of the Safe To Learn Program (FY 00-02).

# Prevent Violence License Plates

Illinois citizens have significantly contributed to Illinois violence prevention programs by purchasing the special Prevent Violence

(PV) license plates available though the Secretary of State's Office. When the PV plate is purchased and annually at time of renewal, PV plate holders contribute \$25 to the Violence Prevention Fund. Since the PV plate became available in 1996, over \$8.4 million has been generated for violence prevention efforts in Illinois.

# Illinois Youth Play Key Role in Violence Prevention

"Youth must be involved." Since IVPA was founded, that brief but telling principle has pointed to the major contribution young people can make — and are making — in preventing violence.

Through the years, IVPA has supported youth around the state in their efforts to identify needs and create projects that address and prevent youth violence. Youth have focused on many types of violence in their schools and communities with IVPA's support, including teen dating violence, bullying, suicide, hate crimes, and drug and alcohol abuse.

The goal has not just been to address issues that impact youth — but for youth to play a leading role in that process.

IVPA has encouraged youth to be involved in violence prevention through its Youth Advisory Board (YAB), which serves as a collective voice for youth on violence prevention issues, and through the Youth-Led Mini-Grants Program. Both have been facilitated by a collaboration between IVPA and the Illinois Center for Violence Prevention.

Through the Youth Advisory Board, youth leaders have learned about violence and its prevention, developed leadership skills and helped IVPA implement the Youth-Led Mini-Grants Program by reviewing grant proposals and recommending grantees.

The Youth-Led Mini-Grants Program has funded youth-led efforts that serve youth from pre-K through the twelfth grade in all regions of the state. In Fiscal Year 2005 alone, 31 organizations around the state received grants through the program.

# The Importance of Youth Leadership and Violence Prevention

Iris Diaz, Co-Chair, Youth Advisory Board, Illinois Violence Prevention Authority

As youth leaders, I feel that our role is to be responsible for our school, our community, and ourselves. Our job is to end the widespread violence in places where we should feel safe, and where we should be able to learn, work, and play. I have a responsibility to bring issues such as bullying, teen dating violence, and even the disrespect of older people to the front and say that these are wrong and cannot be tolerated.

Violence is becoming a bigger problem in most areas, and it will not only take adults that will stand against those who do violence against others, but it is going to take teens that have strong voices against violence to rise and take this stand. Together, we will work to make sure that this world will function more positively.



Over the past few years, IVPA has also supported the Illinois Children's Mental Health Partnership's efforts to develop and implement Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Standards as part of the Illinois Leaning Standards. Through an interagency agreement with the Illinois State Board of Education, IVPA will administer grants in FY 07 to further professional development on the use of the SEL Standards in the education system.

Technical assistance is essential. In order to foster the implementation of effective prevention programs and collaboration, IVPA has consistently assisted grantees with the background knowledge and skills necessary to be successful. Technical assistance provides a means to bridge the gap between the rapidly expanding scientific knowledge about violence prevention and the demand for this knowledge by people who can apply it in their local settings and communities. IVPA's Safe to Live Implementation Grants Program, which supports the development or enhancement of a community-wide, collaborative approach to violence prevention, is one of many IVPA programs in the last decade to benefit from technical assistance support.

Violence prevention requires a long-term commitment. The problem of violence in our society will not be solved through short-term efforts. We cannot expect communities to be effective in preventing violence without providing sustained and long-term support for their success; one-time or short-term interventions with little follow-up will not yield lasting effects. In order to prevent violence, we must continue to be vigilant in our efforts or we risk the likelihood that the problem will get worse. Since 2003, IVPA's Illinois Health Cares Program has worked to improve the health care system's capacity over the long term to prevent and respond to domestic violence, elder abuse and sexual violence.

Learning through evaluation is important. IVPA's commitment to evaluation includes establishment of the Evaluation Resource Center (ERI) in collaboration with the Illinois Center for Violence Prevention, and conducting funded evaluations of particular grant programs. IVPA's Safe From the Start Program is one of many IVPA programs that demonstrates how evaluation plays a critical role in impacting programs. Formal evaluation efforts conducted by the University of Illinois at Chicago revealed key information about prevalent symptoms displayed by children who have been exposed to violence and the impact of services on these symptoms.

Youth must be involved in violence prevention planning, programs and activities. IVPA has demonstrated its commitment to youth involvement by establishing a Youth Advisory Board and a Youth Led Mini-Grants Program. See page 6 for more information about youth involvement.

# Accomplishments

IVPA's principles embody a strong framework for violence prevention. IVPA's accomplishments confirm the impact of these principles on a comprehensive, collaborative public health and public safety approach to violence prevention.

Violence prevention is best achieved through a multidisciplinary approach. Every program and initiative that IVPA supports is multidisciplinary at its core. One IVPA program that reflects this approach is the Illinois Family Violence Coordinating Councils (IFVCC), which have worked to promote a coordinated response to family violence. The Councils, organized by judicial circuit, have voluntarily come together since 1990 to address violence issues—and now cover every county in Illinois. Convened by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Illinois in 1993, the IFVCC administers statewide projects that address various issues related to family violence.

Collaboration among sectors is critical. IVPA's Collaborative Grants Program builds on the agency's continuing work of participating in violence prevention collaborative efforts as well as seeding new strategies and initiatives. A major example is the agency's leadership in creating and supporting the Illinois Children's Mental Health Partnership. Illinois has become a national leader in advocating for stronger policies and programs that address the mental health needs of children through the Partnership, which is a broad-based effort that includes the perspectives of a wide range of groups who have a stake in this issue.

All forms of interpersonal violence are interconnected. IVPA's programs address the root causes of and the risk and protective factors associated with all forms of interpersonal violence, including child abuse, domestic violence, elder abuse, sexual assault, youth, gang and gun violence, and hate violence. In many cases, multiple forms of violence are addressed at the same time. IVPA's Safe to Live Implementation Grants Program has supported community efforts in three communities to come together and assess violence in their community and develop strategic plans that considered all forms of interpersonal violence and how they are interconnected.

Initiatives must start early in the life span. Launched in 2001, IVPA's Safe From the Start program provides comprehensive support for young children who have been exposed to violence. The program has grown from three to seven sites around the state. In addition to providing therapeutic and support services, local Safe From the Start coalitions conduct public awareness activities to educate the community about the serious impact of exposure to violence on children's brains and on their social, emotional development. More than 600 children and their families have received supportive services through the program.

Initiatives must promote skills building. IVPA recognizes that children and youth must develop prosocial skills if they are to resist violence. In the wake of numerous incidents of school violence around the country, IVPA played a leadership role in developing key school-based violence prevention and skill-building programs. The previous Safe to Learn Grants Program and IVPA's current School Districts Grants program have featured skill-building activities that engage students, parents, teachers and the community in violence prevention — including bullying and bias prevention, conflict resolution, peer mediation, leadership training and peer-to-peer mentoring.

### History

In the late 1980s, a movement to prevent violence in Illinois emerged from concerted efforts to address interpersonal violence and its root causes. That movement led to the creation of the Illinois Violence Prevention Authority (IVPA), the only state agency of its kind in the country.

At first, a statewide conference on the victims of violence brought together a range of leaders working on these issues. Their efforts led to what now defines violence prevention in Illinois - the conviction that violence is a critical public health issue that can be prevented. Their efforts also led to the creation in the early 1990s of the Illinois Council for Violence Prevention (now the Illinois Center for Violence Prevention), a nonprofit organization established to build a violence prevention movement in Illinois by creating public awareness, focusing on all forms of interpersonal violence, and building a constituency of people from many backgrounds to embrace a collaborative approach.

The movement gained momentum when the Illinois General Assembly passed, and the Governor signed, the Illinois Violence Prevention Act of 1995, which authorized the creation of IVPA. The Act reflected a unique partnership between public safety and public health leaders. Jim Ryan, Attorney General for Illinois, and Dr. John Lumpkin, Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health, strongly supported IVPA and served as its first co-chairs.

The Illinois Violence Prevention Act also created an innovative mechanism through which IVPA could raise funds to support statewide anti-violence programs: license plates that promote a message of violence prevention. The license plates have raised over \$8 million for violence prevention work in Illinois. In 1999, state general revenue funds (GRF) became an additional source for IVPA funding.

From the day IVPA was established, it has worked to implement five key goals related to violence prevention:

- Develop and implement a statewide plan for violence prevention;
- Fund local and statewide anti-violence programs;
- Coordinate existing violence prevention initiatives and encourage collaborative projects;
- Evaluate and provide technical assistance for violence prevention programming;
- Conduct public education and awareness efforts about violence and its prevention.

At first, IVPA focused on stimulating community-level, collaborative projects to address a wide variety of violence prevention approaches.

In 2000, the agency introduced, and the General Assembly supported, the highly successful Safe to Learn Program. Over the next three years, nearly \$40 million in grants were made to support safety and violence prevention efforts in Illinois schools through the program. Although Safe to Learn was later a casualty of the state's political process at a time of budget deficits, it reinforced in powerful ways that schools are a critical venue for promoting violence prevention.

In 2003, the agency introduced more focused grants targeted to particular systems or populations. Examples include Safe From the Start, a program that works to reduce the impact of children's exposure to violence, and Illinois Health Cares, a program that helps health providers better prevent and respond to domestic violence, sexual assault and elder abuse.

"The work of IVPA is just beginning," says Shaw. "During our next ten years, we hope to embark on a period of growth and replication of programs in more communities around the state."

One of the sources of IVPA funding is proceeds from the sale of special Prevent Violence (PV) License Plates. Thousands of Illinois drivers have contributed over \$8 million during the past ten years by purchasing the PV plates. When Illinois drivers display the plate on their vehicles, they not only contribute to violence prevention programs, they also send a strong message that violence is preventable.

All of these efforts are pivotal in violence prevention and we are eager to bring these programs to many more communities across Illinois. Hopefully, we will achieve this goal over the next ten years. Through the commitment, cooperation, and dedication of concerned professionals at every level, Illinois has become a shining example to the rest of the nation that violence prevention efforts work and can make a difference.

Wayne.

Barbara has just experienced an end of session unpleasantness. A program under her direction for several years has been moved to another agency and special audits of it were mandated by the General Assembly. There have also been a couple of stories about the program (Barbara, you were right; the WBEZ story is from February; I just saw it yesterday) which include some allegations about the process.

I am being my usual crazy self, but wondered if you and/or Mark (or someone) might just sit down, let Barbara explain how the program was designed and administered, and make sure she has thought through all the issues she needs to going forward.

Some community leaders on Chicago's West Side don't like the way Illinois Gov. Pat Quinn's administration is doling out funds in a \$31 million program to combat Chicago-area youth violence.

They wonder why aldermen are involved and why the pastor of Ald. Deborah Graham (29th) is getting the biggest grant in the city's Austin neighborhood.

Quinn's office and a state agency called the Illinois Violence Prevention Authority are overseeing the program, called the Neighborhood Recovery Initiative. Barbara Shaw, the agency's director, says 205 community groups will receive funds to provide everything from jobs to mentoring and counseling.

"This is a very important program to provide a range of very important services that our young people need," Shaw says. "Smaller agencies, larger agencies, the faith-based community—[we're] really trying to pull together the variety of organizations to be a part of being there for

kids."

The state's first step was choosing a lead agency last fall in each of 23 city neighborhoods and suburbs targeted for help.

Here's the thorny part. Instead of putting out an open request for proposals, the state asked individual Chicago aldermen to recommend the lead agencies. Shaw says that saved time and will help get the services out faster.

But an alderman's role in Chicago's Austin neighborhood has led to some stark accusations. "It's business as usual," says Mary Russell Gardner, who's running in the 29th Ward aldermanic race. "Award my friends that helped me, and Kibbles 'N Bits for everyone else."

Gardner, who is trying to unseat Graham, is making hay about a \$290,000 grant for youth mentoring—the biggest chunk of \$1.2 million stated for Austin in the antiviolence program.

The group selected for that grant, Kingdom Community, Inc., has close ties to Graham. It's run by her pastor, Rev. John Abercrombie of Truth and Deliverance International Ministries.

Graham responds that her opponent is making a stink about nothing. The alderman recommended Circle Family HealthCare Network as Austin's lead agency. Graham insists it was Circle, not her, that chose Kingdom Community for the mentoring.

"I had no input on who the sub-agencies would be—none whatsoever," Graham says. "I had no idea that they had been selected before the press release came out."

Who chose Kingdom Community for the big grant? Andre Hines, Circle's chief executive officer, says the decision was made by a community committee her agency formed. That committee chose most of the Austin groups Circle will oversee in the state's antiviolence program.

Hines isn't claiming Kingdom Community will do a better job on the mentoring than any other Austin group would have. "The only thing we can do is look at who applied and select the best candidate based on those applications," she says, insisting the process was fair.

Kingdom Community isn't the only antiviolence grant recipient in Austin that's raising eyebrows. Learning Network Center, a group chosen to help parents become community leaders, is led by Luther Syas, who circulated signature petitions to get Graham on the 29th Ward ballot.

Hines says she had no idea Syas had any ties to the alderman.

Austin resident Steven McCullough, who until last year led a large West Side social-service provider called Bethel New Life, says he takes Graham's word she didn't pull strings for either her pastor or the petition circulator. But McCullough says there's still a problem: "It doesn't look good."

McCullough, now chief operating officer of a citywide group called the Safer Foundation, says the state has no business letting local politicians steer social-service contracts. "What it can lead to is a situation where an organization is perceived to be favored over another organization that delivers similar services or even a higher quality of service," he says.

McCullough says a transparent process would serve the public better.

The ultimate losers, McCullough adds, may include Graham. If her pastor doesn't come through with excellent youth mentoring, he says, "a lot of fingers will be pointing at her."

Illinois Violence Prevention Authority under Legislative Barrage – A double-barrel legislative attack by the Illinois House against the management and budget of the Illinois Violence Prevention Authority left its executive director weeping at the doors of the House chambers on Saturday.

Over the weekend, after a sharp debate in the Illinois House Public Safety Appropriations Committee, lawmakers approved, 13-5, a resolution, HR 1110 sponsored by State Rep. David Reis (R-Olney), ordering the Illinois Auditor General Bill Holland to investigate the group's spending for fiscal years 2011 and 2012

Democrats Bill Cunningham, Connie Howard and Camille Lily had criticized the proposal as "unnecessary" but the committee's Vice Chair, Democrat Greg Harris of Chicago backed the measure, arguing that if there was no problem, then an audit of the authority, co-chaired by Attorney General Lisa Madigan and Department of Public Health Director, Dr. La Mar Hasbrouck, would prove it.

In February 2011, Chicago MEZ public radio reporter Chip Mitchell reported on allegations of influence peddling regarding authority grants distributed in Chicago. Mitchell noted that Chicago alderman, rather a public bidding process, decide which lead agency in each of 23 city neighborhoods and suburbs will receive a grant. An honest and efficient method if there was ever one, no?

Surprising, an accusation of political favoritism emerged. An agency with ties to ex-State Representative and current 29th Ward Alderman Deborah Graham got a \$290,000 grant for youth mentoring the largest sum of \$1.2 million designated for the Austin neighborhood. A sub-contractor, who passed petitions for Graham, also a got a grant.

Meanwhile, House budget makers have reportedly stripped the authority of at least \$20 million out of the program's \$31 million budget and transferred that money to the Criminal Justice Information Authority. Additionally, fawmakers have allocated that \$20 million to an assortment of community groups in various line items, according to a source.

Barbara/Lorri:

The home invasion attempted robbery late last month involving a group of young men and leading to the death of one of them is a tragedy. We are concerned for all the families, the other M+J participants traumatized by the death of someone they knew, and residents of the community. That the victim and the alleged perpetrator have been part of NRI's Mentoring Plus Jobs program leads us to pause in reflection. Last week, I personally met with Dr. Alice Palmer, the Administrative Coordinator from South Shore, her youth and adults associated with the program and its sponsoring agency.

As regrettable as these events were, the call to dismantle prevention-focused programs such as the Neighborhood Recovery Initiative is unjustified. The conditions that feed into young people making uninformed and dangerous choices call for more support for such programs, not less.

MEE has a two-decade track record of working with the hardest to reach, low-income, at-risk youth and adults. There is a small but inherent risk in engaging and serving a youth population that many may already have given up on. In 15 years of running MEE's evidence-based Community Action Teams (CATs) Model in major cities throughout this country, we have never had one employee commit a violent crime, and all participants associated with the project undergo criminal background checks prior to being hired. Youth, whom Mrs. Olson calls "thugs," and adults who are on record as having committed violent crimes are not eligible to be hired.

In Chicago, which has a deeply ingrained youth violence problem in many areas of the city and suburbs, local youth have been engaged in positive, pro-social activities for the past two years. In that 2-year time period, NRI has hired, and MEE has trained, over 3,000 young people to conduct outreach in their neighborhoods, engaging peers, friends and community residents in conversations, offering them positive coping and action messages.

- No criteria or qualifications were requested to qualify a person to be an advisory board member as it relates to expertise in evaluating an agencies' capacity, collaboration or experience.
- 3. At least two members of the Advisory Committee were employees of Children's Home + Aid which is clearly in violation of the prerequisite that no participant can have members on the Advisory Committee.
- 4. These two employees of Children's Home + Aid conducted evaluations and it is unclear whether they evaluated their own organization.
- 5. The scoring process utilized by the Advisory Committee was devised by Jimi Orange, Project Director and lacks true scales and measurements based on the fact that the responses to the application are all subjective and cannot be given a normative value.
- 6. The chosen participants were given a phone interview and a site visit evaluation and in some cases multiple interviews. Liberated was not awarded either.
- 7. I called Jimi Orange to inform him that Liberated was not granted an interview nor site visit evaluation and was told that the process was only for those agencies that the committee had questions.
- 8. Based upon meetings each agency should have been evaluated by four advisory board members (Mentoring Plus Jobs) and three members (Reentry). Liberated was evaluated by one of the four (Mentoring Plus Jobs) and two of the three (Reentry). In no case were they evaluated or interviewed by the entire committee as was the awardees.
- 9. Based upon review of the evaluations one awardee received a score as low as a 27 of 100.
- 10. Liberated was informed by lead agency that their size (large), collaborative efforts (many) and fiscal experience (a large budget) worked against them being selected. Of all, which were, suppose to be measurements that qualify and not disqualify applicants.
